Do you have a beloved lamp that is broken? A blender that wobbles? How about a clock that won't keep time?

Rather than throw it away, bring it to the Repair Cafe - a local event where skilled volunteers gather to repair electronics, lamps, small appliances, leather goods, wooden furniture, and jewelry, mend clothing, and sharpen tools. If they are unable to repair your item, they will make suggestions on where you can find the parts or where to have it professionally repaired.

Repair Cafe is a global movement that started in Europe with the goal of reducing waste as well as



educating people on how to repair everyday items rather then throw them away. It is free and open to anyone, regardless of age or income.

Area cafes alternate between the Curtis Memorial Library in Brunswick and the Patten Free Library in Bath. The next cafe will be held **Saturday May 20th at the Curtis Memorial Library**. It starts at 10 am and is on a first come, first served basis - so arrive early. Depending on the turnout they cannot guarantee they will be able to help everyone or repair every item - but they try! If you have any questions or if there is something you would like repaired but don't know if they can help, you can call Hannah Lackoff at (207) 443-5141 for more information. HAH volunteers, Gayle Hays and Martha Israel, attended the café in January and highly recommend you bring your well-worn, treasured items in need of some TLC to the Repair Cafe.

While HAH certainly has a myriad of programs that rely on the leadership, talents and time commitment of many volunteers, we certainly realize that lives are busy and not everyone is able to make an ongoing volunteer commitment. We also know that many neighbors would like to lend a hand to another when the effort and the time is right. Not necessarily every week, or every month but when it works for you on your schedule – just now and then.

Our hope is by sharing some of these tasks, something on the list might appeal to you and that you'd be willing to lend a hand occasionally. If something does cause that "A-HAH" moment, please reach out to our volunteer coordinator Jane Clavet to let her know that you'd willingly volunteer for a given task - now and then.

Fill in for a regular and deliver a MIP route.

Put up town house numbers.

Represent HAH at community events.

Stack wood.

Fill a bird feeder or two.

Distribute flyers to local businesses.

Place or pick up outdoor sandwich boards.

Move furniture or appliances.

Help coordinate a Lunch with Friends. On either the Neck, Orrs/Bailey's or Cundy's Harbor

Cook for MIP – whenever your schedule allows. If our times don't work for you, you can freeze your contribution, and we will pick up. Or consider cooking for MIP at the last minute to fill in a gap in foods needed. We can often supply the food or gift card to cover expense.

Install a microwave or something similar.

Deliver seasonal flower arrangements.

Help with mailings to HAH program recipients.

<u>Support our seasonal Sharing Tables effort.</u> Coordinate one of our 3 locations. Locations on the Neck, Orr's Island and Cundy's Harbor.

Join our cooking group at Mid-Coast Hunger Prevention's kitchen. Cook one month or help with the shopping prior. We provide the list and the \$\$.

<u>Share your hobby or interest by presenting at our</u> <u>Friend's Together Program.</u>

> Help drive "stuff" around as needed. No driving clearance required.

Interview a neighbor for our Living History program. Help capture memories and reflections.

Changes to the Maine State Housing Authority grant that funds much of HAH's Home Repairs efforts will allow us to effectively double what we are able to spend on a home for 2023. This will allow our team to recommend and do more for local homeowners.

This is a <u>Win/Win</u> for not only does it expand our Home Repairs Team's reach, but potentially HAH's as well. Our Home Repairs program is a gateway to HAH as each Home Repair homeowner is visited by a member of HAH's Resources Team who is able to share insights into HAH and other community services. These visits can lead to home safety checks, placement of reflective house numbers and a connection to many of the programs HAH has to offer. It is exciting to see how expansion in one area of our efforts, leads to growth in others.
